Overview and Outcomes

This course empowers teachers to bring environmental issues to the forefront, both in the classroom and institutionally.

You will discover new ways to engage with your learners about the climate crisis, addressing topics like climate justice and dealing with big climate emotions. You will help students feel confident in making a difference and connect lessons and institution-wide projects to the UN's Sustainable Development Goals. You will create teaching tools that encourage action on climate change, adapt materials to focus on the environment, understand how language shapes future leaders, and learn how to handle tough topics by integrating climate education into every lesson. This course guides teachers to inspire a generation of proactive citizens, from the classroom to the world.

Who is the course suitable for?

- English language teachers, and educators working in bilingual contexts, who aim to empower themselves in shaping purposeful language lessons with tangible impact within the broader scope of environmental education.
- Those teaching upper primary (11-12) to upper secondary (16-18) and young adult students.
- Participants should have a minimum language level corresponding to B2 on the Common European Framework

Content

Environmental Sustainability in Language Teaching includes content drawn from some or all of the following areas:

- In-depth exploration of subjects ranging from climate justice to eco-anxiety
- Building the confidence in students to use their voices to make change in the world
- The Sustainability Development Goals and how to use them
- Practical ideas to inspire your students to take a greener approach to life both inside the classroom and beyond
- Developing and adapting existing materials with an environmental focus
- Language and its relation to the climate crisis
- Having fun with change-making and developing a passion and a meaning that goes beyond language
- Green finances and how to include them in our lessons
- Finding out which green skills we have and which we need to work on
- Integrating climate crisis education into every lesson.

Specific course content comes from feedback you and other participants give us through pre-course questionnaires, identifying your needs and priorities.

We build time into the course for reflection, to consider how to adapt the content to your own professional context.

We then support you in creating a strategy for putting your ideas into practice on returning to your institution.

Timetable

This course consists of 50 hours of tuition, delivered between 09:00 and 16:00, Monday - Friday. You will also take part in cross-curricular workshops on a variety of topics, and each course includes a free evening and weekend programme of social and cultural activities and trips.
